

Autumn Health Warning! Do not read unless you are serious about sharing your faith and the Good News of Jesus Christ with others.

Do you find that September is very often the start of things again?

As Christians in Tynedale, we have serious faith work to do if we are to share Jesus Christ with others and see the Kingdom of God grow in this area. So, in this introduction to Living Waters, here are some 'Fresh Start Faith Tips' to help us all become a little more confident with sharing the Good News:

- **Read Colossians 4:2-6 and pray through it and think about the passage**
- **Practise sharing your own faith story in front of a mirror or with a friend.**
 - Try to pull out key points and remember, there are NO second-class stories.
 - God works in each of us in different ways and those listening will be touched in different ways. Ordinary stories can be very helpful
- **Practise telling the 'God story'**
 - What is essential to say about following Jesus?
 - Share the essentials but don't worry too much about terminology – try to use words that everyone will understand, not 'church' words
 - Read and learn John 3:16
- **Pray each day for an opportunity to talk to someone about Jesus**

Remember!

- ✚ **The essential Christian story**
 - God loves the world so much – he loves you and me and all creation
 - Because of this he gave his only Son Jesus Christ to die for each one of us to forgive us our sins (the things we do that are wrong and hurt us and others and God)
 - If we believe in Jesus and have a relationship with him, we will have eternal life after this life
 - Death will not be darkness and nothingness – there are greater things with Christ to look forward to


The Tyne Valley branch of the Gideons had been trying to get into the school to enable a scripture distribution for over 3 years, since Allendale Middle School had closed and many of their year 7 & 8 pupils had been relocated to Haydon Bridge High. After letters, emails and visits over this period – we now had an answer. I shared this with members of Haydon Bridge chapel who said that one of the Easter Cards they sent out to businesses and organisations from the **Moving into the Neighbourhood** Lent Group, was to send one to the management of the school, not only wishing them a Happy Easter but they were remembered in prayer too.

By the time we had managed to arrange a date, the exam season was upon them and the hall for an assembly was not available, but could we come in to be part of a PSHE class for each year group? A whole lesson to explain why we believed the Bible was the best guide book to life! I asked a lady member of the branch if she would be willing to help plan an interactive presentation, having been a Deputy Head Teacher of a big school herself. It turned out she was an ex pupil of Haydon Bridge and still had the testament she was given there many years previously, when she herself was a student.

We were delighted with the response from the school and are now planned to be part of the annual PSHE programme for year 7. Thank you Haydon Bridge for your faithfulness and your prayers too.

Ordination Day! July 1st 2018

Ordination Day was the culmination of a lot of training and then working as a Probationary Minister. It was a privilege to finally be recognised by the Methodist Church as a 'fully fledged' Minister.



The day started with the service of Reception into Full Connexion at Nottingham University, where we, as Probationary Ministers were introduced onto the platform as a full cohort. There was worship in song, drama and prayer, and the Word by the new President of Conference, followed by a 'sending out'.

At this point, Probationary Ministers were split into smaller groups and I went to Chesterfield Parish Church, (the Church with the twisted spire) for the full Ordination, along with five other Presbyters.

And what a time it was! Paul was my assisting minister. The church was packed with people including a coach load who had travelled from Tynedale for the occasion – those from my own section of churches and across the circuit. It was a joy to have such support – thank you so much.



The service was amazing – a full church singing lustily; preaching by the Rev. 'Positive notes'


Over the last few weeks, there have been two separate positive incidents concerning Haydon Bridge Church and our members –

‘HOLY HABITS’ AT CORBRIDGE

Our small house fellowship / bible study group, which meets weekly on a Tuesday evening during term time, are currently studying and reflecting on this book, with reference to the early Christian church community, who met daily in prayer, worship and sharing together. (Acts ch 2 vs 42 - 47)



QUOTE: “So in case you are wondering

‘Holy Habits’ is a book about following Jesus, about Christian discipleship. It is not a clothing catalogue for nuns.”

The more challenging chapters are in part 2 of the book which explores 10 holy habits: Biblical teaching, Fellowship, Breaking of bread, Prayer, Giving, Service, Eating together, Gladness and generosity, Worship, Making more disciples.

The author is a Methodist Minister who includes his personal testimonies and experiences along his own journey of faith and discipleship. Quote: “I write this book as a disciple of Jesus. The root meaning of the Greek word for disciple, mathetes, is ‘one who learns as they follow’. I identify with that meaning and write as one who is learning as I seek to follow, recognising that I still have much to learn.”

Rev. Jane (Cook) introduced us to this book and we will continue studies up to Advent. Wylam church have also been studying this as well. I recommend this book to all the Circuit, either as a personal read, or to use in a small group setting.

ENGAGING WITH GOD THROUGH
PRAYER, PRAISE and MINISTRY

Closer happens on the **3rd Tuesday of the month at 7.30pm** in the **Small Hall at Trinity Methodist Church**. It is a time of praise, worship, prayer and ministry that enables us to draw closer to God and deepen our relationship with Him.

One of Trinity's weekly house fellowships had been studying the book of Acts and wanted to follow this up exploring the evidence of the work of the Holy Spirit today. They used Roger Jones' recent book 'Spirit Works' and wanted a safe place to allow them to develop the gifts of the Holy Spirit so they brought their house group into the church once a month for worship, which created space for God to speak as a demonstration from what they had learned. This coincided with the belief of certain other members of the congregation who felt that they were missing an element of the contemporary worship they used to enjoy on a quarterly basis in the evenings of Praise, Prayer & Ministry – a completely open service for sharing, testimony and prayer.

We worship God in an informal setting aiming to come into, and spending time just sitting in His presence. We have no other agenda, so there is time to bask in His presence, creating a space for God to speak to us; individually, or someone might bring a prophetic word. It's a safe place for us to grow in using the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Prayer flows in and out of worship and we are led by the Holy Spirit. Sometimes we may minister to each other, a time to experience God's healing and wholeness. Sometimes we sit in silence, just soaked in God as we receive from Him.

Recently we have provided art materials to enable people to express their worship visually.

Praise is led either by Neil & Sue Paterson or Isaac & Amy Webb.

People from other churches are welcome to join us; it's *open to anyone* who wants to explore coming closer to God; we meet next on Tuesday 18th. September. **Please feel free to come!!**

So.....I'm 46, single, have a cat called Tigger, and work as a Staff Nurse at the Freeman and RVI. Having done my training in Harrogate, I worked in Germany and in London before returning to the North East in 2000. Whilst doing my training I also became involved with the Girl Guide movement, and have been a Warranted Assistant Brownie Guider since 1992.

Having first made a commitment to Christ aged 14 after attending Prudhoe Methodist Youth Fellowship, and had many twists and turns and ups and downs since, I went on a Walk to Emmaus in 2003. What was absolutely drummed into my heart over that weekend experience was that God LOVED me. I'd known it for years in my head, but God used my walk to assure me in my heart. This affirmation may seem a small thing, but to me it was a huge thing, and since then, God has taken me on a journey of discovery where I am realising that with His help and through His grace my experiences can be used to benefit others.

Why do I preach? Because I believe this is something God wants me to do.

What do I enjoy about preaching? Knowing that I have to ask for God's help and go in His strength and not my own, but knowing also that God will NOT let me down.

What do I enjoy about preaching in Tynedale? The blessings I receive from the people I meet, and knowing that God goes ahead of me, every day and surrounds me the whole time with His love.

In farming terms (my Grandfather was Tot Brewis of Laker Hall Farm, Stocksfield) God prepares the ground. I've an idea God is doing exciting things in Tynedale. Help us to remember to pray at all times, about everything, and never to think that something is too trivial and we shouldn't be bothering You about it. You want us to come to You with all our hurts, complaints, thanks, hopes and aspirations, and for that we say THANK YOU LORD. As Matt Redman says, You NEVER let go of us. AMEN."

“All good things come to an end. Tom Teasdale our gardener at Prudhoe Methodist Church decided to hang up his trowel two months ago after more than twenty five years. It is only when things stop that we realise their value and my husband and I as we walked to church last Sunday, commented on the sad state of the garden now Tom had retired. So, with the sun shining on Bank Holiday Saturday it seemed right to at least go and sweep the paths and we set off with a spring in our step.

Why am I telling you this? Certainly not for praise.

As some of you will already know I am a Local Preacher on trial and as part of my studies I have been looking at difference and diversity. My first thoughts were to be drawn to ethnicity but as I have travelled around the churches in the Tynedale Circuit I have noticed we are not too culturally diverse so, as ever, this is proving to be somewhat of a challenge!

Whilst sweeping, both my husband and I were approached by many people of different ages, some next door neighbours of the church, some shoppers passing through, mothers with children on their way to and from dance class held at the church and it was then that I realised that I had the answer to my prayers. God provides and often when we are least expecting it. Why do I ever doubt?

With such wonderful weather, fellowship and opportunity we decided to spend the day in the garden and what a blessing it was. I was gifted the chance to discuss our church, God’s creation and His great love for us and for others.

The magnolia tree was in full bloom and one little girl, only about 3 years old was walking through with her mother. They were discussing the colours of the flowers and how beautiful they were as they walked.

As she climbed the steps she was looking at her feet and was quite puffed out. At the top she stopped to catch her breath and say hello. As she raised her eyes the look of sheer wonder and pure delight was truly amazing as she saw the big magnolia flowers. We spent a few moments talking about our wonderful world and how good it is to keep looking up so we don't miss things and see everything that God provides. She was lovely.



It was evident that our older passers-by had lost that open wonder of the garden and were more concerned with human frailty. Tom had obviously spent many hours chatting to people as he worked and he was sorely missed. They were concerned for his wellbeing and wanted to be remembered to him, 'I'm the one with the Jack Russell, I'm sure he'll remember.'

Our conversations changed from simple descriptions to discussing worries of how much longer they would be able to climb the steps and see the garden, to end of life issues and where do we go next?

Our celebration and thanksgiving throughout the day for the wonder of creation felt like an act of worship, it was a meeting with God's people and a way of witnessing of God's love to those who might not have met this before. We had a blessed and fulfilling day, meeting people, witnessing and sharing God's love and the beauty of His creation.

The different discussions throughout the day only reinforced to me the importance of adapting our worship to ensure it is attractive and reachable by the different ages in our congregations.

If anything the day was too hot for the job we tried to do but we returned home that evening very tired but very thankful to a God who never lets us down and always provides wonderful blessings along the way."

The Greatest Story Ever Knitted

There are a variety of ways of making the Bible known to people. Using the creative talents of its members, Corbridge Methodist Church did this by opening its doors the weekend of 11th/12th August to tell “The Greatest Story Ever Knitted”. A total of 10 knitted tableau filled the window sills and communion area of the church telling Bible stories ranging from Creation to Ascension, each one with a printed commentary and a Bible open at the appropriate place. The tableau were arranged, and many of the figures knitted, by church member Brenda Sykes whose skills in the art of knitting were much appreciated by the hundred and thirty or so visitors who came through the church that weekend. The event was widely publicised and some visitors had travelled as far as the coast to be there.

Although not intended as a money-raising event, visitors made generous contributions and a total of £385.00 was raised for the Bible Society, with a further £150.00 from the sale of refreshments going to Reaching the Unreached, a charity being adopted by this church for its work in supporting the poor and marginalised in southern India.

It was also an opportunity to tell visitors about our church and its activities, and we were pleased to receive a request for information about these to be displayed in a local complex of retirement flats. It shows how we can use all sorts of means to share the good news of God's love.

The Creation Story

(Our Circuit Administrator's son and daughter-in-law)

We are here in Japan spreading the good news of God's love, it's an amazing challenge and adventure, our three kids are immersed in the language and the culture, may be they will do more than us in the future!

We recently started a small second church in Yokohama where we found a building we could use and we have church once a month there, so far we have about 15 people including our family attending – this area is a two and a half hour journey from our home.

Recently we went to a museum together with the church members, a museum about the hidden Christians of Japan. When Francis Xavier a Portuguese missionary began to convert hundreds of thousands of Japanese people to Christianity in the 16th century, the government became suspicious and totally outlawed the Christian religion. They expelled missionaries, burnt churches, they killed hundreds of thousands of Christians with cruel deaths.

The government forces would come to villages and make everyone line up, then people had to take turns to step on a wooden image of Jesus, if you stepped on the image you went free, if you didn't step on the image you died. Believers were often crucified or burned or hung over a pit and left to bleed to death. This period lasted between 1614-1853!, During this time many Christians went into hiding!

The museum shows artefacts such as an ornament of Buddah with a crucifix hidden in the back and it also shows the wooden images people had to stand on to reject Jesus Christ, images as shown here.



Now we live in a free Japan, we can preach and teach and open churches. Japanese people can become Christians easily today although they face family pressures - such as what about praying to their ancestors? Visiting family graves 3 or 4 times a year praying for and to the dead?


