

I've been thinking a lot lately about how we 'see' Jesus. We are always being asked to share our faith and 'introduce others to Jesus' but often we find this very difficult.

Have you ever been out shopping with a friend or family member when someone walks up to you both and says hello? You look at them, and think 'I know that I know you but I can't remember HOW I know you!' The friend I came shopping with is waiting to be introduced and I just can't think who you are!

Often when we think about sharing faith we feel a similar kind of panic. We think 'How can I talk about Jesus? What should I say, what if I get it wrong? We feel incapable of 'introducing' Jesus to those around us but we can introduce him, we can get to know him better, we can share Jesus if we are brave enough.


Getting to know Jesus happens when we read the gospels and start to change the way we 'see' him. Read those stories of Jesus that you think you know well and ask yourself, how did the people in this event see Jesus that day? What did he show them? His love? His forgiveness? His power? Imagine being a disciple in the boat when Jesus calmed the storm, a member of the crowd when Zaccheus is in the tree, a mourner at Lazarus' tomb.....what did they learn about Jesus in that moment?

As we feed repeatedly on God's word and pray to God asking for help, we will come to see Jesus more and more clearly and as we get to know him, allowing ourselves to be surprised again by these stories, so we will feel more able to introduce others to him, trusting that God will bless us and give us the right words to say.

May God bless you as you read again the stories of Jesus and may he bless us all as we seek to share Jesus and introduce others to him.

Ken Williamson, Haltwhistle Methodist Church's Community Worker, also takes weekly assemblies at Haltwhistle First School.

For those of my generation who do not, and cannot, comprehend why facebook exists. I am trying to make friends outside of facebook while applying the same principles. MESSY CHURCH: is a form of church for children and adults that involves creativity, celebration and hospitality and is primarily for people who don't already belong to another form of church

It typically includes a creative time to explore a biblical theme – some of which may be messy, a short celebration time involving story, prayer, song, games and similar; and a sit-down simple meal. All elements are for, and should include, people of all ages, adults and children. It's all-age. It's fun.

It models and promotes good ways of growing as a family: a nuclear family, an extended family, a global and church family. Its aim is to introduce Jesus and learn more of the Christian story.

WHAT MESSY CHURCH ISN'T: Just for children: A Club: Just for families: All are welcome; single, widowed, childless, divorced. Church is inclusive, not exclusive.

1st. Hexham Boys Brigade

The Hexham Company of Boys Brigade also celebrated its 10th. anniversary since reforming at Hexham West End Methodist Church in January 2009 on the 18th.

The Seniors arranged all age games and, of course, food was involved.

A mother of two of the boys, who is registered as a BB helper, baked a large chocolate cake for the occasion.

Four of the Seniors have been working toward their Queen's Badge, the highest award for a Boys Brigade boy, some of whom started aged 8 in 2009. They should be awarded these at the Open Evening on Friday 12th. July by Lord Donald Curry of Kirkharle. Additionally two boys will receive their President's Badge. All other boys will get badges commensurate with the activities they have been involved in.

1st.Hexham have started an Anchors Section. This is for boys from the age 5 through to 8. It starts earlier in the evening than the rest of the company, but joins in with Junior Section physical activities at the start of their evening.

The Company Captain, Mark Knowles, would be happy to hear of anybody who might be interested in helping with the running of the evenings or with some of the administration involved. A treasurer would be most useful at the moment.

ATC at West End

We had the boys and girls from the ATC Hexham squadron at West End on Sunday 6th. February. It was such a lovely service and the squadron were a credit to both their parents and organisation. Millie Robinson.

The ATC (also known as the RAF Cadets) is a UK-wide organisation with over 40,000 members aged between 12 and 20.

Young people have the opportunity to do adventure training, flying, competitive sports, drill, shooting, music and many other activities. 224 Squadron meets at the Army Reserve Centre in Temperley Place two evenings a week. As in the RAF, every squadron has a chaplain assigned to help with personal development and pastoral care. The padre will visit the squadron regularly, sharing in talks or discussions, or more often simply being there to watch and share with the usual activities. The squadron will usually parade in church on Battle of Britain Sunday in September and on the first Sunday in February to celebrate the birthday of the Corps. They also parade at the Cenotaph on Remembrance Sunday each November.

Rev Tony Buglass first became chaplain to 224 in 1994, when he was minister in Corbridge. In later appointments he was padre to squadrons in Scarborough and Halifax, before retiring to Hexham and returning to the Hexham squadron.

NB: It is pleasing to note that some of the boys and girls are ex BB, one of the boys currently taking it in turns for evenings at ATC and BB, a decision told to me after visiting a squadron Open Evening, or are part of the Trinity based youth groups. JM



A WEEK IN THE LIFE OF.....

Hello, my name is Isaac Webb and I'm the Children's Worker at Hexham Trinity Methodist Church and some of my hours are assigned to West End Chapel. My role involves working with children between the ages of 0 - 13, and working alongside our youth worker Tara Barrick. I'm also a new dad, my wife Amy and I had our first child in December, so I am getting used to fatherhood...

I have been asked to provide an insight into what a week in the life of a children's worker in Hexham is like, so here we go:

Monday:

Our Parent's and Babies group meets from 9am - 12pm so I arrive before they do! I spend the morning serving tea, coffee and cake, chatting with parents and on some weeks running bible story sessions with the toddler aged children. After we've tidied up and cleaned the kitchen it's usually around 1pm. The early afternoon is time for meetings or spending time on admin. and planning for the different groups we run.

Young people who are from the two middle schools, years 5-7, start arriving not long after 3.30 pm. for our after school group, HT3, which needs nearly an hour's preparation. We spend the time snacking and chatting when they come in from school, playing various games, having a slightly deeper discussion on a topic, and making a craft or baking. By the time the kids have gone home and we have tidied up the mess it's about 6pm, time to go home. When I get home it's my turn to be with our baby to give my wife a chance to have a break after a long day on her own with him!

Tuesday:

This is usually my admin and meetings day, so I spend the morning in the church office prepping materials, contacting volunteers or having meetings. Often I catch up with Tara and talk about our various joint groups for the week, and plan our termly events and theme nights.

Wednesday:

Currently we are running a Youth Alpha course on Wednesday evenings for anyone aged 11-18 wishing to explore the Christian faith. I share this with Tara. We spend a couple of hours watching video materials and discussing life's big questions.

Thursday:

I try to get to church for about 8am to get all the various props and costumes out and ready for our Open the Book assemblies as our team is now going into all the first schools in Hexham. I am the coordinator for this ecumenical team. Every Thursday we go into St.Mary's RC school which has their assembly at 9.05 am. We allow 25 minutes to coordinate roles and rehearse before delivering the assembly, telling a bible story from the Open the Book programme. There is time back at the church to do more admin, planning or available for meetings with volunteers. Every other week we have another Open the Book early in the afternoon for The Sele School. So I do it all again with some different volunteers and a different story.

Friday:

Every other week we do Open the Book at Hexham First School so I spend some time getting the costumes and props prepped and get there for 10am. We deliver the assembly and take everything back to church, then I go home for lunch. On Friday evenings I am a leader at Boys Brigade at West End Methodist Church which starts at 7pm. I try to arrive 15 minutes before to help set up and then be part of the evening. By the time we have tidied up it is usually past 9pm when we leave.

Sunday:

I am responsible for planning the Sunday Club Rota for our children and families that runs during the main Sunday services. For the topics and volunteers. I am involved on the Rota twice a month, so on those mornings I get to church at about 9:30am to set up for the session and finish off the prep. I am always involved in the quarterly All Age Worship Services. After we have tidied everything away it will be about 12:30pm and I head home after church to spend time with my family. Until the evening.

That is when we have our Youth Group meetings at church. I plan and deliver, with volunteers, the Junior Youth age group (ages 11-14). I have to make sure that everything is prepared and set up before 6.00 pm. The Senior Youth Group joins us at 7.30 pm with Tara in charge and we have a joint time until the Junior's leave at 8pm. I can get away about 8.15pm. Then early on Monday morning, we start all over again.

In addition to the regular weekly groups that I run, we also provide other groups and events for the young people in Hexham. 'Let's talk about' is a half-termly group where we meet with members of our youth groups in a coffee shop and discuss a current 'big issue' - it's a chance for them to bring along their friends and discuss questions that they might have. Once a term we combine both of the Sunday night youth groups for one big theme night, so far this year they have included movie night, carnival night and potato night! We also take the youth group to Ask 7:7 regularly which is a YFC run worship event in Newcastle.

Although this is an overview of my regular working week, there is often something new or different happening week to week. I love my job and the variety that it brings, it certainly keeps me on my toes! Balancing my role with my new responsibilities as a Dad has definitely been a learning curve. Thankfully, during these early days, my church family and teams of volunteers have been very understanding when I've turned up to work a little late and looking worse for wear after a rough night with a newborn!

John Wesley Way. A 3 day walk

Last October, I organised a walk with over 30 people following Wesley's route to the oldest Chapels in Teesdale, Weardale and the Allen valley where Wesley had preached. It was a 3 day walk organised by Haltwhistle Walking Festival following some of the old carrier routes where he would have travelled on horseback. The routes did not follow the valleys but went straight across the hills.



The whole route was around 38 miles and the walks were graded as strenuous. Starting in Middleton in Teasdale we followed the Tees to Newbiggin Chapel before climbing to cross the County Boundary and descend into Weardale to High House Chapel. Picking up our route on Day 2 we spent 20 mins in High House Chapel before walking along Weardale way to Killhope then climbing to Killhope Law and down into Allenheads. On Day 3 the route took us from Allenheads to the historic Swinhope Chapel (now a house) and over the Carrier's Way to the East Allen and on to Keenley Chapel where the walk ended.

During the 3 days participants were given a real insight into the remarkable life of John Wesley, his faith and commitment and a sense of God's calling. Our walkers were made aware of the overwhelming history of all three Chapels. For myself as a practising Methodist it was a very moving pilgrimage.

Sadly since we started planning this walk Newbiggin Chapel has closed and High House Chapel in Weardale are facing significant costs to deal with Dry Rot problems.

The North East Methodist History Society was formed over fifty years ago to provide a forum for those interested in Methodist history in the North East. With 100 members, drawn mainly from the region, it holds two main regional meetings each year and publishes a much-respected Bulletin to be found in local record offices and libraries.

FOCUS ON.....KEENLEY

An area in the Allen Valleys in which the Holy Spirit moved powerfully during the 18th.century revival and many effective preachers were raised and through which many of the leading Methodist figures passed on their travels. One of John Wesley's earliest lay preachers', Christopher Hopper a school teacher from County Durham, came to Allendale to preach to the 'notoriously ignorant, rude and illiterate inhabitants' in 1747. Although it gave rise 'to much excitement, a great congregation gathered who behaved well and heard the word gladly', so much so that the following year he gave up his teaching post and moved to Hindley Hill at Keenley, a former Quaker farmstead to pursue a full time preaching vocation. Here he held services in the long kitchen, and where John Wesley stayed, until a chapel was created from two cottages in 1750. Although rebuilt in 1875, its location remains where it still now stands. Jacob Rowell, of Whitfield, a notorious cock-fighter was converted by Christopher Hopper and became himself an effective itinerant preacher around the Dales. A Joseph Ritson who became President of the Primitive Methodist Conference in 1913 was converted at Keenley Chapel in 1832.

Keenley Chapel in its stunning setting claims to be the oldest Methodist Chapel in the world still holding regular services. They continue to be held at Keenley once every fortnight.

John Wesley preached under the Sycamore tree in Keenley graveyard. Some of the gravestones you may be able to just see over the wall

“Keenley Chapel is a very special place to worship. It is a place of peace and God's presence is tangible. The small congregation at Keenley are (as their name suggests) really keen to learn more about the Scriptures and move on with God. With that in mind, they have put into place a more 'interactive' form of worship. We gather round 'Billy' the stove for our worship together.

The service includes hymns and prayers, but there is no longer a 'traditional' preach - it is much more discussion based learning from the Scriptures. Discussion and questions can be wide ranging and varied but we try to keep coming back to the original text. As true Methodists, the congregation wanted to keep up their singing - with 3 or 4 hymns, one of which is chosen by a member on the day.

In terms of our mission, much is about our prayer, as the population around the chapel is extremely sparse, but the generations of worshippers through that special place does mean that the congregation are serious in their prayer for the Chapel, its offering of worship and its surroundings. On leaving a service especially at the end of an afternoon, when the light outside is just starting to fade, the beauty of creation which envelops the chapel is another stark reminder of God's absolute majesty and can at times take your breath away”.

The Keenley congregation are very much a part of the section and some of the members help at Catton lunches and joint services are attended.

“The chapel folk join with Haltwhistle Chapel for a Saturday afternoon of Easter Praise (20th April this year) to share in celebration, worship, food and fellowship where friends can be invited and donations can be given to help keep the Chapel well-loved and looked after.

Whether you are used to worship in a large, medium or small worshipping group, Keenley is a very special place to meet with God. Why not 'taste and see!' ”


