It was opened by Rev Jenny Porterpryde who said: "Ruth and Jacqui have been a hugely important part of our church family for a long time. When they said they were going to start the preachers' training we were excited and delighted. It is so lovely to be able to share this occasion and to celebrate together."


The new preachers were admitted by the Circuit's Superintendent Minister, Rev Paul Dunstan, who was joined by Ann Worthy, a mentor for Jacqui and Ruth throughout their training period. Ann said: "The church has examined their knowledge, confidence and conviction. On the recommendation of the Local Preachers' Meeting, they have been approved by the Circuit Meeting for admission to the Office of Ministry of a Local Preacher."

Rev Paul Dunstan said: "Local preachers are called to be worthy in character, to lead God's people in prayer and praise, and to share in the Church's mission in the whole world. Jacqui and Ruth, yours is a responsibility rooted in the word of God. You will bring the message of salvation to all, in season and out of season. As you lead worship and offer good news to others, your own lives will be shaped and transformed."

The preacher at the service was Rev Alex Dunstan, while everyone present, from other Local Preachers to Circuit Ministers, church members and the families of Jacqui and Ruth, sent blessings for the future in their new roles.

Jacqui of Stocksfield and Ruth of Prudhoe spoke of their own respective callings, paid tribute to the people who have supported them along the way and expressed their excitement and dedication for what lies ahead.

The life of a chapel which has been at the heart of a Tyne Valley community for 143 years was celebrated at a special service in October.

The Thanksgiving Service, to mark the closure of Barrasford Methodist Church, was led by Deacon Anne Taylor and supported by Superintendent Minister, Rev Paul Dunstan.

Attended by about 60 people, the service reflected on well over a century of worship and community life at the Victorian building, which has included Sunday school, weddings, baptisms and funerals.

Rev Paul said the chapel had loyal and committed members, but no longer had the numbers to make it viable. He added: "Barrasford chapel is a wonderful place with a proud history. It has served its community for generations and holds treasured memories for many people.

"Numbers at Barrasford have decreased and the church council felt it was no longer possible to continue, and a decision has been made to cease worship. While marking this sad closure, the service was to celebrate the history and the successes of a church which has stood at the heart of community life for almost a century and a half. We want to thank all Local Preachers and Ministers for their faithful ministry over the years. To the people of Barrasford and surrounding areas, thanks to all who have worshipped at the chapel, attended Sunday school and other events at this special place."

Barrasford Methodist Church was built to seat 160 people at a cost of £320 in 1877 and opened during what was reported as a "joyous occasion" in May the following year. Constructed to serve a strong Methodist community, the chapel was unusual among Methodist churches in having a bell to call people to worship. It hosted a special service at the end of the First World War over a century ago in 1918, yet despite the passing of time, retained its original style and character.

The earliest reference to Methodism in Barrasford dates back as far as 1828, with the formation of a Wesleyan Society through what was known as the Wark Mission, with a full-time local preacher supported by Methodists from Newcastle.



Our last service on Sunday October 17th. was one of thanksgiving at Barrasford Chapel. Its service to the community unfortunately coming to an end.

We had a full chapel with people from the circuit, the village and beyond who came together to celebrate this final service. The service was led by our minister Deacon Anne with the Rev Paul Dunstan welcoming the congregation and giving the bidding prayers.

Malcolm Johnson, Charlie Beattie and Richard Dodds read the lessons with Joan Patterson and myself sharing memories of the chapel, and of those who have gone before. Maurice and Michael Hepworth, late of Barrasford, spoke of their time attending the Sunday School and the impact it had on their lives. Maurice eventually becoming an Evangelist. Paul and George Charlton sung a duet; Derek Archer played three pieces on his accordion, stirring traditional hymns to which the congregation happily joined in.

After the service a tea was provided in the village hall, where memories and friendships continued. Thanks be to God for this memorable service, a fitting tribute to the chapel's witness over 143 years.

South Africa continues to have high levels of Covid infections, and they have continued with periodic lockdowns. The area in which we work has also been affected by a major insurrection with significant looting and burning of shops & businesses. This has caused increased unemployment and food shortages.

Our Outreach fund has supported an increasing number of rural Crèches who have increased their feeding programmes to combat the effect of Covid 19. (One is feeding 350/400 children twice a week). Another new feature of our work has been the development of an Education & Training programme to support young adults leaving Rehoboth Care.

Rehoboth Village is full with 80 children and have managed to avoid Covid cases. They have the benefit of having a school in the village.

Next topic is "Follow the Light", all about sunflowers, can't wait for November16th!



Exciting Times in the Allen Valley



A restructure of churches in the Allen Valley is enabling God's mission to be fulfilled in an exciting new way. The four churches at Allendale, Catton, Sparty Lea and Keenley have become one – Allen Valley Methodist Church – with one Church Council.

The new set-up includes morning worship at Allendale Chapel on the second, third and fourth Sunday of the month, but fellowship is taking place across the valley. Café Church is held at Catton once a month on the third Sunday afternoon of the month, with informal worship, different ways into prayer and the chance to discuss all things topical alongside homemade refreshments. Catton also hosts a Tea and Talk Testimony time once a month on a Thursday evening (and Saturday daytime during the winter months)

High Forest Praise takes place on the first Sunday of the month at Sinderhope Community Centre. This is hosted by the Sparty Lea Fellowship who provide an amazing tea!

Keenley is in the process of becoming a Festival Chapel, holding four festival services a year at Harvest, Christmas, Easter and the outdoor Camp Service. In the future, the Chapel hope to celebrate the Methodist Heritage with boards depicting its rich history. It is also hoped that the toilet and kitchen at Keenley will be updated, and passers-by on the neighbouring Isaac's Tea Trail will be able to pop into the chapel, while a 'Friends of Keenley Chapel' group will be formed.

Worship has ceased at Sparty Lea Chapel building, but the church has not ceased. It continues as a strong fellowship group, as well as their hosting of High Forest Praise and joining worship at other places in the Valley.

The restructure has concluded a two-year process during which congregations have been thinking about the way forward for God's mission in the Allen Valley. Rev Alex Dunstan said: "This has been discussed at length with the Church Stewards and all the Allen Valley congregations. "After much prayer, the most missional and forward-thinking opportunity for the Churches in the Allen Valley to serve God was to work together. "It was decided that by becoming one Allen Valley Methodist Church (with one Church Council) people would be free to take up mission opportunities because offices and finances would be shared, and we could work together as the Body of Christ in the Allen Valley." "The vision is to offer everything we do, not as separate chapels, but as the Allen Valley Methodist Church."

The use of technology will be explored in terms of both worship and connecting with others, while home groups and fellowship groups are important in each of the villages. Mission and outreach will be facilitated through Tea and Talk; High Forest Praise; Open the Book; Community Lunches and other small group and invitational events and services; and in ways not yet known, but in which God will lead.

Rev Alex continued: "Gifts, skills and talents will be used in spiritual growth, discipleship and mission, as we seek God's will for the way ahead in the Allen Valley. We want to build a church for now and for the time ahead to serve the folk of this area. "The Allen Valley congregations have prayed hard, listened to God and stepped out in faith. It is exciting times to see how God will work as we go forward together."

The journey God has taken me on over the last few years is one I could never have expected.

In 2016, while working for the Hexham Methodist Churches as Children's Worker, I attended training on a school's assemblies programme called Open the Book. I loved the idea behind telling Bible stories to school children in a dramatic fashion and subsequently set up an ecumenical team to deliver the programme to the three First Schools in Hexham.



In 2017 the Bible Society, who run OtB, advertised for a National Training Manager based in Swindon. As I had been responsible for workforce development when I was Sure Start Lead in Newcastle, I decided to apply for the job. After interviews, I was accepted for the role. Bible Society proved to be an amazing place to work and the following year I was promoted to Head of Open the Book, a real privilege which gave me the chance to link with the 18,000 volunteers nationally on a regular basis. Then, earlier this year I was appointed Head of Operations for Domestic Mission. This includes Church Engagement, Navigating Trauma, Open the Book, our work in Wales, our Education and Catholic Scripture programmes.

When I applied for the job, Trinity's minister David Goodall told me that if I felt prompted by the Lord, I should push on the door and if the door opened, then it was God's plan. That approach has taken me on an exciting path over the last few years and I feel really blessed to be supporting God's mission of the Bible Society through my work as a result.

Summary of Autumn 2021 Circuit Meeting 16th. September

- ➤ The Rev Jenny Porterpryde was appointed for a further year in the Circuit. Rev Jenny's reinvitation was met with a positive response and her appointment was extended until August 2023.
- ➤ The Circuit Invitation Committee was engaged in finding replacements for Rev Paul and Rev Alex, after it was announced that they would be leaving the Methodist Church at the end of August 2022. It was decided to replace these roles as they currently stand, applying for one Superintendent and one Presbyter. The Chair of District had outlined his commitment to making both appointments a priority.
- ➤ The meeting heard that Conference had decided to increase the minimum number of trustees per church from six to 12. While this could be a challenge for some churches, it was agreed there were ways of making this work. A federation of churches, with several churches sharing one church council, was considered. Another possibility considered was for larger churches to work with smaller churches.
- ➤ It was agreed that Circuit would donate 15 percent of reserves to the Methodist Church's Pension Deficit fund. It followed a revaluation of the national fund last year which indicated a substantial shortfall. Conference requested that all districts, circuits and churches donated up to 15 percent of their reserves to address this deficit.
- ➤ Church Councils can now choose whether to register their buildings for samesex marriage. Stewards and Ministers were advised to look at resources which are available on the Methodist Church website prior to Church Council meetings. With no timescale set, churches were encouraged to take time to make careful and considered decisions.
- The meeting acknowledged two new Local Preachers. The admission service for Jacqui Cameron and Ruth Johnson took place on 18th September at Prudhoe Methodist Church. A video of the service is now available on the Circuit website.
- ➤ Rev Paul was to write to several Local Preachers and Readers who have retired to thank them for their ministry Margery Burgess, Brenda Mearns, Lesley Saxon, Ann Worthy, Margaret Weatherson, and Mo Lucas and also to those who have resigned Joyce Short, Mark Knowles, Nigel King, and Dougie Hogg. (Diane Wylie has also resigned since the meeting.)

- ➤ It was agreed to allow worship to cease at Barrasford Methodist Church and for the building to be sold. A Thanksgiving Service to mark the closure of the chapel and to celebrate its history took place on 17th October.
- ➤ The meeting heard that Richard Porter, of Prudhoe, had been accepted for training for presbyteral ministry and was due to commences his studies on Monday, 20th September. A card was to be sent to Richard offering everyone's best wishes and prayers.

Mrs Rene Baillie, of Haydon Bridge, celebrated her 100th birthday on 5th September – a card was to be sent to Rene.

'Action for Children' is a leading Methodist supported children's charity helping vulnerable children and their families in the UK



Like most charities, Action for Children have suffered in their fundraising over the last year because of pandemic restrictions. The usual annual collection in July from Methodist churches was significantly reduced. This has affected the services they can offer.

Although the charity gets some money from government, local authorities and businesses, this kind of funding is not guaranteed long-term and is often restricted and can only be used for specific projects. They rely on individual donations to provide much of the support they give to children and young people.

Since the beginning of the coronavirus pandemic, they have helped more than 20,000 children and young people with emergency support providing essentials that families could not otherwise afford. This includes food, resources for learning and play and home repairs and or furnishings.


