### CHRISTMAS' 'EVERGREEN' SYMBOL.

One of the most pleasing activities of the year is setting up our Christmas tree in the foyer of Haydon Bridge Chapel. It brings cheerfulness and a spirit of optimism in the dark, cold days leading up to Christmas.

The most significant symbol of Christmas is an evergreen tree representing life and when illuminated with lights, represents Jesus, the light of the world and a symbol of hope as we honour his birth.



This tradition has earlier secular origins: ancient Egyptians brought green palm leaves into their homes during their winter solstice and in Roman times houses were decorated with evergreens and laurel wreaths as part of the Saturnalia festival.

In the early 16th century the German theologian Martin Luther began to decorate a small evergreen with candles to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

Queen Victoria's German husband Albert is often associated with introducing the Christmas tree to England in 1840. However, King George III's German wife Queen Charlotte set up a decorated tree at Queens Lodge, Windsor in 1800. This tree was decorated with fruit, flowers and candles.

Gradually, this custom caught on with the British general public, and in all Christian nations around the globe.

### **Autumn Newsletter 2023**

It is some while since we wrote and updated you on our work and the situation in South Africa. Firstly we should say that we have not been able to get back since returning a couple of days prior to lockdown in March 2020. We have however continued our work with our partners, increasing our donations and incorporating new partners.

South Africa continues to have high levels of Covid infections but perhaps more worryingly increased unemployment, and a lack of utilities which includes scheduled electricity blackouts sometimes 12 hours a day, and water shortages. There have recently been a lot of strikes protesting at the lack of basic facilities. HFSAC has been able to increase its support this year particularly increasing our food programmes with our partners who are working in the rural areas.

We have just concluded another year. Income in 2022/23 was £ 62,094 compared with £42,086 the year before; this large increase was due to a legacy from a long-term supporter and two anonymous donations. We made grants totaling £59,630 continuing our policy of not holding any significant reserves. Our only Expenses were £150 for our Web costs. Since we registered the charity in 2004 we have, through our supporters, raised more than £850,000.

### Rehoboth

A recently received newsletter from Rehoboth (if you are not getting it and would like a regular copy please let me know) updating us on their work. There are changes in the way that they operate in that the village is no longer a home for life but a short-term care facility. The children are not now expected to stay more than 2 years. The expectation is that they will be reunified or fostered/adopted. Should a sponsored child leave the village there will be an invitation to sponsor a house rather than an individual .The village continues to run at full capacity. Donations to Rehoboth, including the Sponsorship programme, were nearly £21,000

## **Christmas Present Fund**

Many very kindly give to our Christmas Present fund at this time of year. Should you wish to make a donation, please be aware that all donations are pooled together and transferred to Rehoboth where they are used to provide all the children in the village with presents and parties at Christmas.

## **Outreach into the Community**

Our Outreach fund has supported an increasing number of rural Crèches and other projects with our partners. We increased our support for feeding programmes helping to combat poverty due to high unemployment. (Khula Crèche is feeding 350/400 children twice a week)

Another feature of our work has been the continuing development of our Education & Training programmes to support young adults both leaving Rehoboth Care (we are currently building a room in Granny's complex for one leaver) We have also had referrals from our other projects for support.

We have once again been able to provide a full bursary to Cornerstone Learning Centre a school for children with learning difficulties and donated £5000 for Cornerstone to open a Skills Centre for their older children. This will open in January within the Genesis Trust complex.

The legacy also enabled us to donate £5000 to Greensparks Education to update their 4x4 to continue their work in rural crèches, which we also support with Education equipment and Crèche refurbishment. ## FOCUS ON Hexham West End Church

Our Ladies Group meet on a Tuesday night and is growing in numbers!

This isn't what you would describe as a typical or traditional ladies fellowship meeting.

Our members include Methodists, Catholics, Anglicans, URC members and some who don't attend any church at all. I think many regard room 1 in West End church as **their** church.

We begin our time together with prayer and hymn singing and we are blessed with many excellent visiting speakers, to name but a few and most recently, Robin Charlton spoke about prison chaplaincy, Rev. Fiona spoke on ministry in South Africa, Joe and Anna Beswick spoke on the Eden Project in Hexham, our group found all of these topics a real eye opener and more importantly a call to action, how can we lend our support? We have many more interesting talks and speakers to look forward to.

Our Ladies Group pay both annual and fortnightly subscriptions, which creates the opportunity to support many needy charities. At this time of year it is customary for us to support CRISIS, a charity which for as little as £29.73 per person provides a bed and Christmas dinner for the homeless, for many this opens the door to a life beyond homelessness.

Another perk our group get to enjoy is Hexham Brass practicing in the church on a Tuesday night, we get hear their concerts in advance!

A long-time favourite for many in and outside of our church is **CAMEO** (Come And Meet Each Other) and has been much appreciated by many. CAMEO is held on the third Thursday of every month and provides the opportunity for people to meet for a cuppa and a chat, the meeting opens with devotions and usually a speaker will give a short talk. Once again, not all who enjoy Cameo attend church; many come along to share the friendship, love and support of this safe and friendly gathering. Also the home baking is pretty special!

Recognising that traditional worship is not everyone's preferred style and that Sunday morning is for some families the busiest day of the week, West End hold a monthly, weekday evening service. "ENCOUNTER" offers a great alternative. Many come along to enjoy the informal worship, bible references and readings, testimonies and some inspiring, spirit filled familiar and new songs with music provided by a group of very talented musicians from both West End and Trinity churches.

West End work closely with Churches Together in Hexham, and are privileged to be involved with many group initiatives and activities. Most recently we were introduced by our minister Rev. Gareth to Hexham's **Eden Project**. Eden is a ministry which is planted in areas which have been identified as the most deprived areas of the UK, and can you believe it? The east end of Hexham is one of those!!!



**The Eden Project** mainly based at the Eden Lounge at 1 Wanless Lane provides:

 A community shop, providing needy families with groceries at much reduced prices.

Eden ministries will be preparing 70 hampers to support families this Christmas and Rev. Fiona has found a charitable source to supply new toys to support them, they are overwhelmed by this kindness.

- A drop in centre where families can enjoy a cuppa, seek advice or just find a listening ear.
- A kid's ministry every Friday night, this ministry works to bring the children of
  east end families together. The early stages of the children's work has been
  very successful in creating a group culture of, playing together, caring for each
  other and understanding each other's needs and sticking to the rules.

Working with the children is very rewarding if sometimes chaotic and it's definitely not 'Sunday School' but it's a real joy. Our next venture is to start introducing the OTB bible stories and a good time to start this will be with the nativity story.

The Eden kids ministry's greatest need at the moment is for volunteers, it's hasn't always been possible to find the number of volunteers required to fulfil the safeguarding rules of adults to children ratio and the some sessions have had to be cancelled. If you're up for a joyful challenge please get in touch.

This year West End will hold our annual Christmas in the Car Park event. This will be held on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> December from 4.30pm – 7pm This will be a really fun event for both children and adults and will include a choice of Christmas crafts, a Nativity scene photo booth with costumes, fun games in what we plan will be a magical setting. Even Father Christmas will be paying a visit with a gift for everyone.

A variety of refreshments will be served including the seasonal mulled wine and mince pies.

We at West End Church are very fortunate in many ways, and one of those is the blessing we have in the folks who use our building. They are not necessarily church members, or Methodists or church goers, but they are our friends.

Introduced by Rev. Gareth, Board Games Group meet Tuesday evenings - a great space for enthusiasts to meet, get to know us and become our friends.

**Hexham Brass:** band practice Tuesday evenings – Also generously support our fundraising with free concerts.

**Hexham Male Voice Choir** practice Thursday evenings – Old friends of West End hold concerts in our church attracting many visitors.

**Girl Guides** – long term users and old friends - Support our church activities i.e. Christmas in the Car Park.

We have much to thank the people who use our building, not only for the much needed income they provide.

## CIRCUIT MEETING SEPTEMBER 2023 Summary

On 14 September 2023, Rev Marie Beard chaired the Autumn Circuit Meeting at Fourstones with Warden Methodist Church for the first time as Superintendent Minister.

After devotions and hymn singing led by Rev Marie, the meeting continued with the business at hand. Copies of the Methodist Digest, highlighting matters brought before Conference in June 2023 were recommended to the meeting and for sharing in churches.

The Circuit Safeguarding Policy for 2023/24 was adopted and Ruth Johnson was appointed as Circuit Safeguarding Officer for Adults. Each church was reminded that they need to adopt the latest Church Safeguarding Policy each year.

David Kilner presented a financial report which included details of monies drawn down from the Circuit Model Trust Fund over recent years, a summary of how the assessment is calculated for each church, and the proposed budget. It has been a difficult year financially for the Circuit and a short term loan from the District has been requested whilst the Circuit waits for the sale of properties at Bellingham, Barrasford and Ebenezer.

A summary of the current Circuit property situation was given by George Charlton. The sale of Ebenezer (West Wylam) to Karbon Homes has encountered a set back and amended plans are now back with the Planning Department and the sale of Barrasford is still awaiting guidance from the solicitors. Circuit Meeting approved the sale of the Bellingham Manse as this property is now surplus to requirements.

The bi-annual inspections of the burial grounds at Limestone Brae, High House and Keenley were carried out in September 2023 with the only items being noted were the possible trimming of some trees and the updating of contact details on the gate at Limestone Brae.

The Local Preachers' Meeting report, presented by Tom Dodds, shared the progress being made in improving communication between the ten active Local Preachers and the uncertainty of what facilities are available for worship at churches. Tom Dodds and Laura Wolfe agreed to put together a simple document listing facilities at each church. Robin Charlton's Local Preacher Accreditation Service took place at Hexham Trinity on 10 September.

Current Circuit vacancies include the role of Connexional Funds Treasurer and Circuit Archivist. These vacancies are to be advertised more widely to encourage other people outside of Circuit Meeting to become involved in Circuit life. Jacqui Cameron was appointed as Circuit representative to Hexham Trinity Church Council.

A varied discussion took place on worship and service times. Rev Marie discussed the Circuit context and asked that as well as considering individual church needs that the question of what others in the Circuit need is also considered. Feedback about this from Church Councils is to be sent to Rev Marie.

Circuit Meeting expressed thanks to Tara Barrick and Isaac Webb (from Hexham Trinity) and Ruth Lindridge (from Prudhoe), who have all left their roles at these churches.

The next meeting will be held on **Thursday**, **7 December 2023**, **7.30pm at Stocksfield Methodist Church**.

It is anticipated that the centre will grow organically as we identify what will best serve the Prudhoe community where additional sessions may be tailored and facilitated to meet specific challenges. Meanwhile, all are welcome. Pass the word around particularly as winter approaches.

Having checked with the Rev Caroline Friswell, a retired Anglian priest, who was organising the walk, we decided to sign up. Glen set about finding a B & B - too late for anything on Holy Island, but she booked something within reasonable travelling distance for 2 nights.

We stayed in a lovely house and Rachel, the owner, was very welcoming & chatty. On the Sunday morning over breakfast Rachel talked about her son, Jack, who has Autism/ADHD. Rachel mentioned that Jack is adopted. Glen asked his age [almost 14] and what her husband's name was. "Dan" came the answer.

Glen was overwhelmed as she realised that Rachel & Dan are the adoptive parents of Lara's son who was adopted before she turned her life around. We were all ecstatic, great joy and much hugging. Dan was called from the shower, and we got to greet Jack, who of course was not told who we were.

The Social Services Letterbox Contact system, which entailed a yearly letter and response, had failed despite complaints, and it was about 5 years since we were last in touch. Glen had thought recently that she should get in touch with Northumberland SSD and try to communicate the sad news of Lara's death.

Rachel and Dan very much want to stay in touch and just the following morning we received 60 plus photos of Jack at various ages.

Rachel & Dan told Jack during the school summer holidays and have kept us up to date as he settles into Senior School. We, and our family, look forward to getting to know Jack and his lovely parents in the not too distant future.

Was this just a pure coincidence or, as we believe, a real miracle from God.
