Dear friends,

As I write the first signs of spring are appearing which means it's time for church councils again! Recently I've been reflecting on Peter's declaration that Jesus is the Messiah:

15 He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am? '16 Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God. '17 And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. 18 And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. Matthew 16: 15-18 (NRSVA)

I will build my church...and the gates of Hades will not withstand its advance!

You may remember that a few years ago, the Methodist Conference, our governing body, adopted a notice of motion encouraging every church council to annually address and answer the question: 'Do you have a growth plan or an end of life plan?'

Lots of work was done up and down the country in many church councils thinking about the realities of their situations and futures, but the reality of Covid lockdowns and the closure of our buildings during that time knocked everything sideways and many of our plans were put aside while we dealt with the immediate impact of lockdowns.

However, the issues forcing us to consider whether we have a plan for growth or end of life have not gone away and we know that many of our societies and chapels are vulnerable to the changes we see all around us.

Yet, just as the snowdrops have appeared, heralding the promised spring I can see some positive signs of God doing things in the church and in people's lives. The question of whether we have a growth plan or an end of life plan is a question, not simply about our understanding of church but also our understanding of God the Father, Jesus the Son and the Holy Spirit. If Jesus says He will build His church what does that mean for us? Does God want a dying church? There is an argument that it happens when we stop being church, or certainly stop being God's church. While we celebrate in our Church's Deed of Union that, 'in his providence God raised up Methodism to spread scriptural holiness through the land by proclamation of the evangelical faith,' we need to be mindful that this occurred in a time when the Church of England had lost its way and was failing its people in its ministry. If the church of its day failed to live up to its calling God raised up another. He builds HIS church.

One of the problems we have faced is opting for a growth plan without major changes to the way we do and be church. Paul Nixon in his book, I Refuse To Lead A Dying Church, argues that a lot comes from the choices we make and encourages us as church leaders and members to be active in the decisions:

- Choosing life over death
- Choosing community over isolation
- Choosing fun over drudgery
- Choosing bold over mild
- Choosing to live on the frontier over retreating to the fortress
- Choosing now rather than later

The working out of the practice of these choices will rattle some people - our members and if we're honest, our leaders and staff, as it requires us to do something different and not get drawn back into what we have become accustomed to and comfortable with. We wrestle with a model of church that is located around our buildings, but we are ever mindful that while sometimes these are assets and resources supporting our ministry and mission, sometimes they become liabilities draining our time, energy and money. We may need to see the end of somethings for new life to flourish.

Revisiting our plans will require a some tough decisions but we know that we are not alone - we are a connexional church bound to one another in love and support but also we know - in the dying words of John Wesley, - 'Best of all, God is with us'.

# Circuit Meeting December 2023 Summary

On Thursday, 7 December 2023, an exceptionally rainy evening, Circuit Meeting took place at Stocksfield Methodist Church, a change of venue to that originally agreed.

Rev Marie welcomed everyone to the meeting, including Rev Roberta Ritson, the URC minister for the North Tyne section. Opening devotions followed and then the minutes of the previous meeting agreed.

The Trustees adopted the 2023/24 Safer Recruitment Policy and heard that training and meeting sessions on Safeguarding and EDI were being arranged, with details to be confirmed in the New Year.

A Property Report and the Annual Manse Reports were submitted to the meeting for consideration, and the Corbridge Princes Street Lease, together with the initiatives taking place there, were discussed. The authorised signatories, to sign legal documents on behalf of the Trustees, were agreed.

The Local Preachers' Meeting Report considered flexibility in service times and the use of this year's thematic Lent Series, focussed on Wesley's hymn 'Love Divine, All Loves Excelling'. The Local Preachers intend to follow this series; further information is available on the Methodist Church websites <a href="https://www.methodist.org.uk">www.methodist.org.uk</a>

The meeting then heard that the Connexional Funds Treasurer and Circuit Archivist roles are still vacant and Rev Marie asked that information about these vacancies continues to be shared and people encouraged to consider taking on these vital roles.

The final item of business was a discussion about how often, when and where, to hold Circuit Meeting. Rev Marie proposed that from September 2024, three Circuit Meetings be held each year (in September, February, and June) with additional meetings called if needed. This proposal was carried unanimously.

The next meeting will be held on **Thursday, 14 March at 7.30pm.** The meeting then closed in prayer.



The Rev'd Dr. Stephen Lindridge, currently Chair of the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Methodist District is presently discerning his plans for the future.

The new Chair's role was advertised in February and interviews will be taking place in March. Stephen and the District will appreciate our prayers in this time of change.



**Sunday** – Jesus rides into Jerusalem from Bethpage on a donkey, being welcomed by a large crowd shouting 'Praise God – bless the king who comes in the name of The Lord'. Jesus clears The Temple of traders and money changers. The Roman Governor Pilate arrives in Jerusalem on horse with an escort of Roman soldiers from Caesarea to be 'in town' for the busy period of the Passover festival. (Assumed)

**Monday** – Jesus returns to The Temple from an overnight stay in Bethany to teach, mainly in parables, and His authority is challenged by the leading priests.

**Tuesday** – Both Pharisees and Sadducees meet separately to try and trap Jesus into saying something that they could accuse him of either politically or of Jewish law.

**Wednesday** - The Jewish authorities plot as to how best to capture Him and put Him to death before Passover. Judas Iscariot does a deal with them. Jesus is anointed with expensive perfume by a woman at the home of Simon – an ex leper in Bethany.

**Thursday** – Jesus asks His disciples to prepare the Passover Meal in the city. The Last Supper. Jesus is betrayed and arrested by the Temple guards after the meal while with His disciples at the olive grove outside Jerusalem's walls called Gethsemane.

**Friday** – Jesus is brought before the Sanhedrin (the leading priests and teachers of the law) at the Chief Priests house in the early hours where he is eventually charged with blasphemy for admitting to be the Messiah. Peter denies knowing Jesus. The Jewish leaders bind Jesus and bring him to Pilate on charges of sedition. The Governor recognises all the charges laid against Jesus are religiously motivated. Being informed Jesus was a Galilean, Pilate sends Him to Herod Antipas who had the jurisdiction of Galilee and also happened to be in Jerusalem during the festival for an adjudication (according to Luke.)

Herod finds no case against Jesus of leading a revolt either and is returned to Pilate.

Pilate offers to release Jesus as part the governor's custom to release one prisoner at Passover time. In desperation the Jewish leaders demand the release of the murderer and insurrectionist Barabbas instead and incite the crowd to call for Jesus to be crucified. Although the Governor finds no cause against Jesus, he hopes a flogging would be sufficient to appease the crowd. With the continued call for the death penalty — and the claim by the Jewish authorities that they have no king but Caesar — and seeing that a riot was about to break out — Pilate hands over Jesus to the soldiers to be crucified. Judas Iscariot tries to hand back the thirty pieces of silver once he recognised what he had done. As this was not accepted he commits suicide.

Having been flogged and mocked by the soldiers Jesus is then made to carry his cross to a place outside the city walls called Skull Hill (or Golgotha – in Hebrew or Calvary – in Latin). It is 9 o'clock in the morning when Jesus is crucified with two criminals. The sky darkens over the land for three hours from midday until 3pm when Jesus 'gives up His spirit' with a loud cry and with a resultant earthquake, the curtain in the temple separating the Holy of Holy's is torn in two.

Joseph from Arimathea, a respected Council member, asks Pilate for Jesus' body so that he could lay Him in his own tomb. As time was pressing before the start of the Sabbath at sundown, Jesus is covered in a single sheet without being embalmed before the tomb is sealed with a stone. Both Mary Magdalene and Joseph's mother see where Jesus was laid.

**Saturday** – When the Sabbath ends the women go and buy burial spices so they can embalm Jesus early on the Sunday morning – while the Jewish leaders go to ask Pilate to have guards posted on the tomb to prevent Jesus' disciples coming to remove his body overnight as Jesus had claimed that he would rise on the third day.

## Sunday – RESURRECTION DAY

The tomb's stone is rolled away and it is empty. The women meet angels who tell them Jesus has risen from the dead. Mary Magdalene meets Jesus and thought him to be the gardener (according to John). The guards report what has happened. The Jewish authorities bribe them to stay silent.

The rest, as they say, is history changed.



"For God so loved the world, that he gave His only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him will not perish but have eternal life. God did not send His Son into the world to condemn it, but to save it". John 3: 16/17. (NLT) Jesus took our sins upon himself on the cross so that all who believe and accept this by receiving Christ into their lives have the assurance of a restored relationship with God, the Father.
